Why has Hashem caused a lockdown of so many fundamental Jewish institutions: shuls, yeshivas, schools? This is something that has never happened on such a scale before, a worldwide lockdown that has resulted in a massive destruction of Torah.

Rabbi Yitzchok Sorotzkin explains that Hashem has locked up the Mikdash Me'ats (the miniature Temples) in order that we should instead focus on the real Beis HaMikdash (Temple). As long as we feel that we're successful, in control, and can flourish spiritually while in galus (exile), we totally forget that we are actually living in exile, that Hashem is in exile, and that our homeland is *Eretz Yisrael*.

The Chofetz Chaim says that people make a big mistake when they daven the Shemoneh Esrei (Amidah), focusing on things like livelihood and health, putting little emphasis on the brachos that talk about the geulah (redemption), building Yerushalayim and the Beis HaMikdash, and the return of the Shechina (Hashem's Divine presence). All of our sufferings are a result of the Shechina being in exile. We mustn't daven to get rid of our suffering; that's not what our focus should be about. Instead, we need to recognise that if we would have the Beis Hamikdash, then we wouldn't have all of these troubles and we wouldn't have a need to daven for these things! It is imperative that we focus our attention on these over-looked brachos.

People think that every generation has davened for the redemption, so how will our davening help? This is a mistake. Every tefillah gets added to those of previous generations, so it's not just our generation's davening that is going to bring the redemption, but the sum total. Maybe all that's missing is our tefillos! The closer we get to the coming of Moshiach, the easier it is to bring the redemption - so it's our obligation, perhaps more than any other generation, to daven for the redemption.

The Chofetz Chaim further explains that it's not enough to just daven for the redemption, we have to demand it from Hashem. We need to feel the pain of exile, to feel that the Jewish People cannot exist without the redemption, to yearn for it and to ask for it.

Please G-d, may we merit to experience very soon the dedication of a new Beis Hamikdash and our very own Chanukah celebration.
